Hope Illuminated: Bibb County Relay for Life

On Saturday, May 4th Bibb County's Relay for Life held its annual event at the BMC Wellness Center.

Relay for Life is a community fundraising event organized by the American Cancer Society to honor cancer survivors, remember loved ones lost to cancer, and fight back against the disease. The event typically involves teams of participants taking turns walking or running around a track or designated path for a set period, often 24 hours, to signify that cancer never sleeps.

The Survivors Tea of the Brent Study Club kicked off right on time at 4:00 p.m., marking the beginning of the event's activities. At 5:00 p.m., the Grand Opening ceremony followed, with Anna Stewart delivering the kevnote speech and Mayor Mike Oakley opening the ceremony and Jason Elam leading the rendition of the National Anthem. Survivors and caregivers took the first laps, honoring their strength, while the winners of the Relay for Life Bibb County pageant were acknowledged.

Different groups West Blocton High School, West Blocton Jr. Varsity, Bibb County High School, Centreville Middle School, and Hale County High School, showcased their talents during the event. The audience was treated to performances by majorettes, color guards, and cheerleaders, accompanied by musical acts including the WBHS Jazz Band and The Studio.

Vendors dotted the area, each with their own booth showcasing an array of goods and services. Children of all ages delighted in the face painting and indulged in the delicious food. Meanwhile, churches distributed information about their upcoming Vacation Bible School sessions, adding a touch of summer spirit to the festivities.

Big Al arrived at approximately 6:00 p.m. during the Superhero Kids walk, where both adults and children

donned superhero costumes to show their support for childhood cancer awareness. We made sure not to overlook the politician's pie, as well as the moving Luminaria Ceremony. The kids enjoyed a thrilling scavenger hunt, followed by an outstanding performance by Taylor Bagi. As the night ended, participants were encouraged to bring their own glow items for the Glow Walk.

The evening was filled with excitement and enjoyment. In essence, Relay for Life stands as a potent symbol of hope, unity, and the collaborative endeavor to eliminate cancer.

In a heartfelt gesture honoring the memory of Deputy Brad Johnson, who tragically lost his life in the line of duty nearly two years ago, Spectrum, a leading connectivity brand through Charter Communications. has donated K-9 Ari to the Bibb County Sheriff's Office. This generous contribution was made in collaboration with elected officials, including Lt. Governor Will Ainsworth, Senator April Weaver, and Representative Russell Bedsole as they unified in their efforts to welcome the newest addition to the department's ranks.

At the Bibb County Commission Office on Friday, May 3rd at 11:00 a.m., Lt. Governor Will Ainsworth, State Senator April Weaver, State Representative Russell Bedsole, Chairman of the Bibb County Commission Ty Corbell, Bibb County Sheriff's Office members including Investigator Chris Poole, Brad Johnson's family, Joseph Marchant, Charter Communications representatives including Kevin Keithley and Taylor Vice, and others gathered together for the official announcement and unveiling of K-9 Ari. The event also included a live demonstration by Ari and his trained handler, Deputy Brad Taylor.

Ari, a 2-year-old Dutch Shepherd, symbolizes both remembrance and renewal for the Sheriff's Office, marking the first acquisition since the retirement of its previous canine, Bodie. Sheriff Jody Wade expressed gratitude for Spectrum's tribute, emphasizing Ari's role in revitalizing their K-9 pro-

gram. "His expertise in narcotics detection will enhance public safety throughout our county," Sheriff Wade remarked. In his prayer during the ceremony, Sheriff Wade clarified that they are not "moving on, but moving forward" in continuing Deputy Johnson's legacy of service.

Ari not only serves as a homage but also signifies a practical reinforcement of law enforcement efforts. Partnered with Deputy Brad Taylor, Ari underwent rigorous training over 12 weeks, culminating in their recent certification to work as a team. Together, they stand ready to combat illegal drug activity, to track suspects, and to assist in locating missing individuals. Since their graduation from training on April 12th, Ari and Deputy Taylor have already been involved in 12 cases within Bibb County concerning both missing persons and narcotics.

Jane Rhodes, Senior Vice President of Corporate Physical Security at Charter Communications, Inc., Spectrum's parent company, underscored their commitment to community service. "In providing the funding for K-9 Ari, we honor Deputy Johnson and the law enforcement heroes that are keeping citizens safe," Rhodes affirmed. Charter's donation of nearly \$17,000, facilitated through Cahaba Valley Health Services nonprofit, covered the acquisition of K-9 Ari, equipment, and comprehensive training for both Ari and Deputy Taylor. This was the third K-9 donation made overall by Charter Communications.

Lt. Governor Ainsworth voiced appreciation Spectrum's community-oriented approach, recognizing their dedication beyond mere business transactions. "Bibb County is fortunate to have companies that understand that doing business isn't just about providing service, it's about serving people," he noted.

State Senator April Weaver and Representative Russell Bedsole were both commended for their work in implementing The Deputy Brad Johnson Act, which both restricts and further stipulates criminals being able to earn time off from their original sentences. Senator Weaver affirmed that the work they had done was to ensure that if someone did the crime, they were bound to do the time.

The process to re-implement the K-9 program began about 9 months ago at Deputy Taylor's interest in taking on the role, being the first to succeed fallen Deputy Brad Johnson. From there, funding was sought through donations before Charter Communications committed to fronting the full cost, streamlining the process as much as possible from that point forward.

Ari's role extends beyond law enforcement duties; he will reside with Deputy Taylor, forming a bond that goes far beyond the professional realm. As with all law enforcement K-9s, Ari will serve the department faithfully until he retires (typically when they are about 10 years old), after which he will enjoy a well-deserved retirement in

a loving home. Spectrum's donation of K-9 Ari stands as a testament to the enduring spirit of service and remembrance, embodying the shared commitment to community well-being and honoring the sacrifices of those who dedicate their

lives to public safety. Without a doubt, K-9 Ari and Deputy Brad Taylor will serve as an impactful, dynamic duo to further protect the people of Bibb County.

Have Thine Own Way, Lord

"Have Thine Own Way, God's will. Lord" - what a phrase of surrender, and a phrase that God is probably quite used to wrestling from many of our own grasps. For those of us who like control, who like to feel capable and competent in our own right, this is perhaps a phrase that when it finally falls from our lips, it's after God has proven to us that no matter what, His way is the best way, even when we cannot comprehend it.

"Have Thine Own Way, Lord" is a well-known hymn that has been sung in churches and beyond for over a century. The hymn was written by Adelaide Pollard in 1907, and its message of surrender to God has resonated with believers ever since.

Adelaide Pollard was born in 1862 in Bloomfield, Iowa. She was a gifted speaker and evangelist, traveling across the United States and Europe to share the gospel message. Pollard was particularly moved by the story of Jacob wrestling with God in the book of Genesis, and she felt that she too needed to surren-

der her will to God. In 1902, Pollard was attending a prayer meeting in with the words, "Have thine New York City when she own way, Lord! 

> The festival also featured a station where they could have an encounter with Ruby Raindrop, the festival's beloved mascot, while the kids listened to a whimsical tale of the water cycle brought to life. This playful narrative, coupled with a lively game of dot-to-dot, brought laughter and learning together in engaging ways.

After a morning of learning and a picnic style lunch, that further educated kids on the importance of water from

Missouri who traveled to Bibb County for the Groundwater Festival. Including a humorous mix of magic and mystery (their specialty), students were able to participate in some of the magic tricks as well. 


