Offset Print Presses Make Way For The Digital Age

The Centreville Press has been producing a rural community newspaper in Bibb County, Alabama since the 19th century and remains one of the oldest continuous publications in the State. History dates the first publication to 1880. The Alabama Department of Archives and History reveals that there were multiple newspapers being printed in Bibb County in that historic era. Some of the publication names that you may have never heard of included the Bibb County News, the Blocton Reflector, the County Press, State Central Express, the Eoline Messenger, the Central Enquirer, and the Bibb Blade.


The best contemporary remembrance of these defunct publications was the Bibb Blade. In 1936 Mr. Frank Gist wrote about his newspaper experiences in a letter to the Centreville Press editor. Gist recalled that he and his father published the Bibb Blade in Six Mile beginning in 1881. He said the Blade was founded by Frank P. Glass and operated originally from the Glass Store in Six Mile, then was purchased by Pratt and Suttle and published from the rear of their Six Mile store. The publication was moved to Centreville in 1888 and moved again to Blocton under new owners in 1892, according to Gist. Eventually, the Bibb Blade would be acquired by the owners of the Centreville Press. Some original copies of the Bibb Blade are still preserved today in

Centreville Press archives. In a memorandum found among his possessions by his grand daughter Melanie, James W. Oakley Sr. wrote of his sudden introduction to the newspaper business when his father, O.C. Oakley, purchased the Centreville Press from Mrs. L.H. Nunnelee. The year was 1927 and Oakley was still in high school, having reached the tender age of 16 years. The Oakley family took over the operation of the newspaper on July 1 of that year and Jim Sr.

packed off to a training class in New Orleans. He journeyed to learn the Linotype process while his mother ran the business office and produced the

newspaper. Oakley (James W. Oakley Sr.-1911-1972) wrote that the Press had acquired a Mergenthaler linotype machine two years earlier. After 7 months of training Oakley returned to Centreville in 1928 and plunged into operating the newspaper, only to face the stock market crash and the Great Depression less than a year later.

Legislative Session Fails to Let Alabamians Vote on a Lottery

The regular Legislative Session ended on May 9, with final passage of both budgets, which is the only constitutionally mandated requirement of the legislature during its annual legislative session.

However, there was another constitutional question that dominated the session – the perennial issue of whether Alabamians will ever be allowed to purchase lottery tickets in Alabama and keep Alabamians money within our state. This money could help educate Alabama children, pave Alabama roads, and remedy the closing of our rural hospitals. However, these Alabama dollars currently are going to our four surrounding states of Florida, Georgia, Tennessee, and Mississippi, who all allow the purchase of lottery tickets.

Alabama is now one of only four states in America that do not have a lottery. It comes as no surprise that most Alabamians - both Republicans and Democrats – find this absurd. In fact 80% of Alabamians when polled, say they adamantly want their legislators to vote in favor of simply giving Alabamians the right to vote on whether to keep their lottery dollars at home. This same reliable polling reveals that the Alabamians in favor of a state lottery, also attend church up to two times a week and already gamble on sporting events and drive out of state to purchase lottery tickets. This is especially true of people under

Today, most Alabamians see nothing irreverent or wrong, much less sinful, about buying a lottery ticket or betting on a football game. Georgia's Hope Scholarship Program, created 25 years ago through a statewide lottery bill, provides free college education for their students. At this point, Alabamians have educated untold numbers of Georgia students. It is no coincidence the largest outlets for purchasing lottery tickets are located along

Georgia's Alabama border. The same holds true along Florida's Alabama border. The people in Dothan and the Wiregrass, alone, have probably paved most of the roads throughout the panhandle of Florida.

Therefore, the question remains, if 80% of Alabamians want the right to vote on a lottery and our state leaders are fully aware that unregulated and untaxed gaming already exists in our state, why did the lottery vote fail yet again during this year's annual legislative session? Because Special Interests got involved.

Unfortunately, most of the 140 members of the legislature are being falsely accused. The vast majority voted in favor of allowing Alabamians the right to vote on whether to keep gaming/ lottery dollars in Alabama. However, because the creation of a lottery requires a constitutional amendment, a three-fifths vote is needed for the measure to pass. That means 63 votes are needed in the House and 21 votes in the Senate. The bill passed the House comfortably with a 72 to 29 vote but failed in the Senate with a final vote of 20 to 15. While most Senators voted in favor of the bill, it needed one more vote to pass.

Gov. Ivev and Speaker Ledbetter are listening to the outcry from Alabamians. Neither are being deterred by special interests. Kay Ivey has built her legacy by being one of the most honest governors in my lifetime. She has always sided with and acted on what is in the best interests of her fellow Alabamians.

Hopefully, for Alabama's sake, you have not heard the last of this issue.

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





That Will Be" was penned by James Hill in 1955, inspired by two poignant figures in his life: an orphan girl and his mother-in-law. The seed for this beloved hymn was planted years earlier when an orphan girl sang at Hill's Baptist church. She concluded her song with the words, "What a day that will be," a phrase that resonated deeply with Hill and stayed with him

over the years. However, the immediate catalyst for writing the hymn came from a personal family tragedy. Hill's mother-in-law suffered a debilitating stroke at the age of 50, leaving her par-Hill struggled to comprehend why such a terrible thing would happen to such a kind and devout woman. One day, while reflecting on his mother-in-law's suffering and the trials she faced, Hill found himself on his porch, and the words to the hymn began to flow into his

Despite having never written a song before, Hill felt compelled to put his thoughts and feelings into words. Unsure of its quality, he decided to share it with his family. On their next visit to his mother-inlaw, Hill, his wife, and his

The hymn "What a Day sister-in-law sang the new eye hymn all the way to her home. When they arrived, they sang it again, and miraculously, for the first time in three years, Hill's mother-in-law smiled and showed signs of joy and excitement.

To Hill, this reaction

was a divine confirmation that his song was blessed by God. "What a Day That Will Be" has since become an anthem of encouragement and hope for countless people, resonating deeply with its message of a future without sorrow, pain, or death. The hymn draws on the comforting promise found in Revelation 21:4: "And God shall wipe away alyzed. As a new Christian, all tears from their eyes; and there shall be no more death, neither sorrow, nor crying, neither shall there there be any more pain: for the former things are passed away."

Recorded by over 1,000 singing groups and individuals, "What a Day That Will Be" continues to inspire and uplift, providing solace and a reminder of the eternal peace promised to believ-

Jim Oakley Sr. welcomed his son Jim Oakley Jr. into the newspaper business when he graduated from the University of Alabama and returned to Bibb County in 1958 at the age of 23. He was soon in charge of the newspaper and ran it successfully for the next three decades.

In 1969 the Oakley's erected a metal building addition to the Centreville Press operation and purchased a three unit Goss Community Press with a mechanical folder, from the Goss Company of Chicago, IL. The first edition of the paper to roll off of these new offset presses arrived on August 21, 1969. A native of Germany worked for Goss and stayed in Centreville for months to install and calibrate the new printing presses. These huge printing presses would stay in operation over a span of 46 years. Local print production came to a halt in 2015 as the costs of maintenance and production finally brought local printing to a close

After nearly 10 years of mechanical silence the current Centreville Press owners have removed the last vestiges of the Goss printing presses from the metal building where newspapers were last produced. The Goss Community Press machinery has been removed to

reclaim building space and is destined for metal recyclers. As the cost of print production continued to climb the newspaper reached a point that local production was no longer economically feasible and contracted with another print house to produce the weekly editions.

Still in place and operable the Centreville Press retains a historic Heidelberg Press that was used for job printing or custom print jobs. The Heidelberg Press holds a significant place in the history of the newspaper print industry, particularly in the context of offset printing technology. Developed by the German company Heidelberger Druckmaschinen AG, the Heidelberg Press revolutionized the newspaper printing process and played a crucial role in the mass production of newspapers worldwide.

Before the advent of offset printing, newspapers were primarily printed using letterpress or other manual methods, which were time-consuming and limited in their efficiency. Offset printing, which the Heidelberg Press specialized in, introduced a more streamlined and cost-effective printing process.
