Vance Ellison B&B Hosts Book Signing with Bibb County Native & Author R.L.

Foster: "Lessons Learned at Full Draw'"

On Saturday, August 31st. the Vance Ellison Bed and Breakfast welcomed a large crowd for a book signing event featuring Bibb County native and author R.L. (Rick) Foster. His book, Lessons Learned at Full Draw: A Guide's Lifelong Pursuit of Trophy Whitetail, chronicles the valuable lessons he as a guide and his clients have gained over years of hunting whitetail deer. Foster shares his insights from the field, offering readers a deeper understanding of mature whitetails and, more importantly, what it takes to become a successful hunter.

Growing up in a small central town of Bibb County, Alabama, R.L. (Rick) Foster developed a natural love for the outdoors. His Granddaddy Edwards lived in rural Perry County, where R.L. had the opportunity to start hunting the only big game animal in Alabama, the whitetail deer.

With guidance from his uncle, Howard Edwards, who organized "deer drives," R.L. harvested his first buck at the age of thirteen. This sparked a lifelong passion for hunting whitetail deer.

In the early years of his hunting career, R.L. was successful in harvesting bucks with a rifle. However, by his late twenties, his interest shifted from rifle hunting to bowhunting, and from simply hunting deer to targeting older, mature bucks. At that time, Alabama had high deer numbers but very little deer management. This led R.L. to explore the trophy potential in some mid-western states. His research pointed him to west central Illinois, a region gaining a reputation for producing high-scoring whitetails that were making it into the record books.

After numerous scouting trips to "The Prairie State," R.L. was able to secure several prime leases in Illinois. He found this mix of broken agricultural land and hardwood timber to be ideal for bowhunting. In 1993, he decided to turn his passion for bowhunting into a business, leading to the formation of

Trophy Class Outfitters. Since then, Trophy Class Outfitters (TCO) has expanded into other top trophy-hunting states across the Midwest. In addition to operating in Pike and Adams Counties in Illinois, TCO has run bow hunts in Schuyler County, Missouri; Henry County, Kentucky; and Monroe County, Iowa. They continue to manage bow hunts on a 14,000-acre ranch in the Flint Hills of Kansas. Beyond the Midwest, TCO has also operated bow hunts in Baylor County, Texas, and in R.L.'s home state of Alabama, in the same Cahaba River bottoms where he began hunting as a child.

Running a successful


multi-state bowhunting operation requires a focus on making each location the best it can be. R.L. has always prioritized quality over quantity, a principle he applies to his Kansas property. His passion for studying the habits of mature whitetail deer and the bowhunters who pursue them continues to drive his enthusiasm.


Trophy Class Outfitters (TCO) has always been a team effort. The hard work

The Alabama Cooperative Extension System's Master Gardener Program offers the perfect opportunity for you to expand your gardening knowledge while giving back to your community. This volunteer program is designed for those with a desire to learn, grow, and help others flourish.

Master Gardeners are volunteers trained to provide research-based gardening information to their communities. By joining this program, you'll gain valuable horticultural knowledge and have the chance to share it with others, helping to improve the quality of life in your community.

To participate in the upcoming program, applications are open from November 1st through 30th, with an early bird fee of \$150 if you apply by November 15th. NEW AARP Report: Impact of Historic Medicare Rx Out-of-Pocket Spending Cap on Alabama Seniors

Today, AARP released a report revealing that an estimated 61,000 Alabamians on Medicare prescription drug plans will benefit from a new out-of-pocket spending cap starting January 1, 2025. This milestone is a result of the 2022 prescription drug law, championed by AARP, which will limit annual outof-pocket costs for America's 56 million Medicare drug

plan enrollees to \$2,000. The AARP report provides a detailed analysis of the impact of this cap by state, age, gender, and race from 2025 to 2029. The findings show that Medicare drug plan enrollees who reach the new out-of-pocket cap will save an average of \$1,500, or 56%, in 2025.

"AARP fought hard for the 2022 prescription drug law because they recognized its potential to provide vital relief for Medicare enrollees in Alabama and across the nation by reducing drug prices and out-of-pocket expenses. This offers Alabama seniors



Where the Crawdads Sing by Delia Owens

While some of you have probably seen the movie, I have too, the book is always better. Reading a book just seems to put you in the story. The novel covers events in the period 1952 to 1970 and the central character is Kya (short for Catherine) Clark, known to the local rural community of Barkley Cove as "the swamp girl".

the novel is crucial because Kya becomes an integral part of it. The novel is told on two timelines. It opens in 1969 with the discovery of a body in an old tower beside the swamp. The victim is Chase Andrews, a local man, the sporting pride of Barkley Cove, suave, confident and outgoing, he is married but has a reputation as something of a playboy. The local police begin their investigation.

The novel then reverts to 1952where six-year-old Kya, the fifth and youngest child of a 'swamp' family (one which lives in a rundown house beside the swamp, where their income is precarious and their reputation as outsiders separates them from the mainstream Barkley Cove community) watches her fragile mother walking down the dirt track away from their home, leaving the family for good. Kya's father is a feckless, violent drunk and Kva's older siblings gradually leave the home too, unable to bear his aggressive dominance. This leaves Kya on her own with her father.

At times they are able to live relatively agreeably together - he sometimes gives her money from his war pension (the family's only income) and she is able to purchase supplies from the town – but mostly, he disappears, sometimes for days at a time, and Kya is forced to learn to fend for herself Eventually he disappears altogether. Kya manages to evade the local authorities who try and get her to attend school; they give up eventually too. Kya grows up alone developing an intimate knowledge of the natural world of the swamp, living in harmony with it. Kva avoids everyone in the town, she has learned to stay under the radar of both the authorities and the two gossips, to whom she is a mystery, to be treated with suspicion and disdain, but she makes three friends: Jumpin', and his wife Mabel, the proprietor of the swamp-side general store where she must go to replenish her basic supplies, and childhood playmate Tate Walker.

When the young child Kya starts to visit his store alone, Jumpin' quickly realizes that she is living alone and he and his wife support and protect her discreetly as best they can. Tate Walker was friends with Kya from a very young age when they played together and is well aware of her father's violent tendencies. His mother died, a loss which binds them, and he lives alone with his father. When Kya's father vanishes, they renew their acquaintance, and their relationship deepens. Tate receives the education Kya is denied and is ambitious to go to college and study natural science.

He promises that he will visit Kya during the vacations, but on his first visit home he spots Kya from a distance on the beach near her hut and realizes that she is almost a wild creature (that is indeed part of what he loves about her) and that she will never be able to fit into the new academic world he now inhabits.

Tate leaves Kya without saying goodbye or explaining. In her deep grief at being abandoned once again Kya falls into a relationship with Chase Andrews. He seduces her and the two begin a secret affair.

Chase tells Kya that he will marry her, though he never introduces her to his family. On a visit to Barkley Cove Kya sees an announcement in the local newspaper that Chase is engaged to be married. Kya's progress, from small child learning to live by her wits to beautiful young woman living alone on the swamp, fending for herself, is told alongside the story of the police investigation into Chase Andrews's murder. Inevitably, the twin stories collide when Kya is accused by Chase's mother and charged with the murder. The account of the trial is told in gripping detail. No spoilers here, however, as it will have you on the edge of your seat! I cried several times throughout this book there are so many big moments in it. The plotting is extremely clever. The characters are all strong, fully thought through and well-rounded. But what makes this book so brilliant, and what for me makes it great, is that it is just an extremely good story!





Gospel Group - "The Thrasher Brothers"

The Thrasher Brothers— Jim, Buddy, and Joe—hail from Heflin, AL, and are best known for their gospel singing career, although they've also made their mark in country and opera music.

Their journey began in the 1950s when they first performed at the Grand Ole Opry during the Friday Night Wally Fowler Gospel Sing. They continued to grace the stage in Nashville and sang at churches and school auditoriums throughout Alabama.

The brothers gained national recognition after appearing on the Ted Mack Show in New York City, where they won the National Talent Show. This victory led to a two-year stint as regular performers on the show.

In 1970, they launched their own television show, "America Sings," which was syndicated in over 100 markets across the U.S. and attracted an estimated 8 million viewers each week until it ended in 1976. Their rendition of "One a gospel music classic, earning them a Gold record in 1975.

In 1980, the Thrasher Brothers ventured into country music, performing on major concert stages across the nation. They released several albums with MCA Records and recorded the theme song "Best of Friends" for the popular CBS television show "Simon and Simon." Their hit song "Still The One" became a classic in both country and pop music.

Over their 38-year career, the Thrasher Brothers traveled extensively throughout the USA, Europe, and the Middle East. They toured with notable country artists such as Alabama, Mickey Gilley, Hank Williams Jr., Willie Nelson, Barbara Mandrell, and Loretta Lynn, performing live

Day At A Time" became for millions. They also appeared on numerous national television shows, including "Hee Haw,"

The Thrasher Brothers have won the Dove Award from the Gospel Music Association and have received four Grammy Awards from the National and Recording Science Academy and many more awards for their contributions to the music and entertainment industry.

Alabama Faces Record Pine **Beetle Infestation**

As of August 22, the Alabama Forestry Commission (AFC) has found nearly 5,000 spots where Southern pine beetles (SPB) are living across the state. On average, each spot has killed about 191 pine trees. This number is expected to grow for the rest of the

Alabama's timber industry is important for our economy, and these pine beetles are a serious threat. The AFC is working hard to find beetle spots and inform landowners about the issue.

State Forester Rick Oates mentioned, "This is the highest number of beetle spots we've seen in Alabama in the last 23 years. We have checked 51 counties so far and will check more soon. States like Mississippi and Georgia are also seeing many beetle spots. It looks like this is a very ac-

Counties with more than Calhoun, Choctaw, Clay, Colbert, Coosa, Franklin, Lamar, Lawrence, Marion, Perry, Randolph, Talladega, and Winston. The worst areas are around Bankhead National Forest and the Oakmulgee District of Talladega National Forest. The Tigers (1-2 overall, 0-1 in region play) will host region foe Holt (2-1 overall, 0-1 in region) this Friday at 7 p.m.






