On November 5, 2024, the Bibb County School District partnered with the Alabama Law Enforcement Agency (ALEA) and the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children (NCMEC) to bring the NetSmartz Internet Safety Program to our students. This program educates children ages 5-17, along with trusted adults, on safe online habits and responsible digital citizenship through engaging, age-appropriate presentations.

Students learned how to stay safer online, handle inappropriate requests, and practice respect and kindness in digital spaces. The program also covered safe choices for sharing personal information and reporting disturbing content.

A special Parent Night was held on Thursday, November 7, from 5:00-6:00 p.m., where experts from NCMEC provided valuable insights and resources to help families protect children in the digital world.

With a deep commitment to promoting nutrition education in schools and working with community programs, Sherry has a profound impact on residents of Bibb and Chilton counties. Here, she shares insights into her work, family life, and the values that drive her to support her community.



Salted Caramel Ritz Cracker Cheesecake

Ingredients

16 oz cream cheese two blocks, at room temperature

1 cup granulated sugar

3/4 cup heavy cream

pinch of salt

1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract

48 Ritz Crackers

2/3 cup salted caramel sauce + more for garnish

whipped cream

The caramel sauce 1 cup granulated sugar

1/4 cup water 1 teaspoon sea salt

3/4 cup heavy cream

3 tbsp butter 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Directions:

Line 8×8 glass baking dish with plastic wrap. Set aside. In a large bowl, mix cream cheese and sugar

together until smooth. Add in heavy cream, salt and vanilla and whip until thick and fluffy, about 3 minutes. Heat sugar and water in a small saucepan over medium heat to melt the sugar. Continue cooking and swirling sugar until it turns amber in color. Whisk in sea salt and heavy cream. The mixture will bubble up violently briefly. Continue whisking until sauce is smooth. Stir in butter and vanilla. Spread 16 ritz crackers across the bottom in 3 straight lines. Add on 1/3 of the cream cheese mixture. Drizzle over 1/3 cup caramel sauce and repeat these layers again as follows: 16 crackers, 1/3 cream cheese mixture, 1/3 cup caramel sauce, 16 crackers, final amount of cream cheese mixture. Cover and refrigerate 12 hours or overnight. To serve, cut into pieces and top with whipped cream and more caramel sauce.



James D. Hardy: Surgeon

James D. Hardy (May 14, 1918 - February 19, 2003) was an American surgeon who performed the world's first lung transplant. The surgery took place on June 11, 1963, at the University of Mississippi Medical Center in Jackson, Mississippi. The recipient, John Russell, survived for 18 days after the transplant.

On the morning of January 24, 1964, James D. Hardy attempted the world's first modern heart transplant by placing a chimpanzee heart into the chest of Boyd Rush, a comatose and dying patient. The heart functioned for about an hour, but Rush never regained consciousness and passed away. The consent form did not mention the possibility of using a chimpanzee heart, though Hardy later stated he had discussed it with Rush's stepsister. Before proceeding, Hardy consulted with four assisting doctors, with one voting yes, one abstaining, and two nodding in agreement. This groundbreaking xenotransplant was performed at the University of Mississippi Medical Center in Jackson.

James Hardy was raised in Newala, Alabama, a small community in Shelby County, where his father owned a lime plant. He attended high school in nearby Montevallo before enrolling in the University of Alabama to study pre-med. In 1942, he earned his medical degree from the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine in Philadelphia. During his senior year, he served as president of the Alpha Omega Alpha honor society, and his first scientific publication focused on wound healing.

In early 1944, James Hardy joined the U.S. Army Medical Corps during World War II, initially serving at Stark General Hospital in Charleston, South Carolina. In 1950, he began writing his first book, Surgery and the Endocrine System, which was published in 1952. For his research on using heavy water to measure body fluids, Hardy received a Master of Medical Science degree in physiological chemistry from the University of Pennsylvania in 1951. In 1955, he became the chair of surgery and the first Professor of Surgery at the University of Mississippi School of Medicine in Jackson.

James Hardy authored 24 books, 139 book chapters, 466 papers, and produced over 200 films. In 1971, the Vishnevsky Institute in Moscow honored him for his groundbreaking work in organ transplantation, awarding him medals for his contributions to lung and heart transplants. Hardy also served as president of several prestigious organizations, including the Society of University Surgeons, the Society of Surgical Chairmen, the Southern Surgical Association, the American College of Surgeons, the American Surgical Association, and the International Society of Surgery.

James Hardy led the team that performed a doublelung transplant while leaving the heart intact. In April 1963, 58-year-old John Russell was admitted to the University of Mississippi Medical Center in Jackson, Mississippi, due to recurrent pneumonia that did not respond to antibiotics. He also suffered from emphysema in both lungs, squamous cell carcinoma in his left lung, and kidney disease. Complicating the situation, Russell was a prisoner at the Mis-



sissippi State Penitentiary, University, who had transserving a life sentence for murder. One source mentions that he was in prison in the early 1960s. for accidentally shooting and killing a 14-year-old boy. Hardy noted that although Russell was serving a life sentence for a capital offense, there was no discussion with him about changing his prison sentence. However, state government authorities were contacted privately and indicated they might have a favorable view to medical progress through the transplant.

Before the surgery, John Russell often woke up at night coughing up bloody sputum until he turned blue. One source indicates that he died from a combination of cancer, infection, and



Around 11:00 23, Rush went into shock with low blood pressure, prompting Hardy to take him into the operating room. Rush's heart stopped just beheart-lung machine. Hardy then consulted with the four other doctors assisting him to decide whether to proceed with the transplant using one of the chimpanzee hearts, aware that they might face significant public criticism. One doctor voted yes, another abstained, and the last two nodded in agreement.

Just after 2:00 a.m. on Friday, January 24, 1964, Hardy finished stitching the chimpanzee heart into Rush's chest and used a defibrillator to restart the donor heart. The chimpanzee heartbeat in Rush's chest for approximately one hour before it could not be restarted.
