

# "Jesus Loves Me": A Beloved Hymn of Childlike Faith

"Jesus Loves Me" is one of the most wellknown and cherished Christian hymns of all time. Though often associated with children's ministries, its message is simple yet profound declaring the unshakable love of Christ in words that resonate across generations. The hymn's history is rooted in the 19th century and intertwines with both American literature and music.

The words to "Jesus Loves Me" were first written not as a hymn, but as part of a novel. In 1860, Anna Bartlett Warner penned the lyrics as a poem in Say and Seal, a book she co-authored with her sister, Susan Warner. In the novel, the poem is recited by a Sunday school teacher to comfort a dying child. The tender scene captured readers' hearts, and so did the simple poem. Anna and Susan Warner were devout Christians who lived on Constitution Island near West Point Military Academy, where they held Bible classes for cadets. Their home is still preserved today as a place of historical and spiritual significance.

The transformation of "Jesus Loves Me" into a hymn occurred shortly

after the novel's publication. In 1862, renowned William composer Bradbury, Batchelder moved by the poem, wrote the now-familiar melody and added the famous chorus: "Yes, Jesus loves me, yes, Jesus loves me, yes, Jesus loves me, the Bible tells me so."

Bradbury was a key figure in the promotion of gospel music during the 19th century. His contribution turned the poem into a singable, memorable hymn, and it quickly spread in popularity, especially among children's Sunday school groups.

"Jesus Loves Me" soon became a cornerstone of Christian children's music, not just in the United States, but around the world. Missionaries used the song to teach children in other languages, and its simple message of Christ's love made it easy to translate and sing across cultures. The hymn's power lies in its simplicity. The lyrics are easy to understand, yet they speak profound theological truths: Jesus loves us, He gave His life for us, and the Bible confirms His love. Even in times of hardship, the hymn has brought com-

Fun Fact: President Dwight D. Eisenhower reportedly requested the hymn "Jesus Loves Me" to be sung at his bedside near the end of his life. This shows how deeply its message has touched people from all walks of

Whether sung by a child in Sunday school or a weary soul seeking comfort, "Jesus Loves Me" is more than a children's tune—it's a declaration of eternal truth.







#### THE HISTORY OF THE WEST **BLOCTON COKE OVENS: ALABAMA'S** INDUSTRIAL PAST PRESERVED

Nestled in the heart of Bibb County, Alabama, the West Blocton Coke Ovens stand as a striking reminder of the area's once-booming coal and iron industry. These now-silent brick structures once roared with fire and smoke, producing the coke that fueled Alabama's steel industry during its rise in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Today, the site is a cherished historical park—an educational resource and a symbol of the hardworking people who helped shape the re-

gion's industrial legacy. Coke is a fuel made by heating bituminous coal in the absence of air, driving off volatile compounds and leaving behind a carbon-rich material. This process, known as "coking," produces a substance that burns hotter and cleaner than raw coal, making it ideal for use in iron and steel production. Beehive coke ovens, like those found in West Blocton, were commonly used during the 1800s. Shaped like domes and built of brick, each oven was loaded with coal and sealed while being burned for days. Workers then cooled the ovens and removed the hardened coke.

West Blocton was established in the late 1800s as part of the Bibb County coal boom, spurred by the growing

demand for iron and steel in nearby Birmingham, which was quickly becoming a Southern industrial hub. Rich coal seams in the Cahaba Coal Field brought mining companies to the region, and towns like West Blocton sprang up to support the growing workforce.

The coke ovens were


built along the hillside near town and operated by various coal companies, including the Woodward Iron Company. At its peak, West Blocton had over 400 ovens, supplying high-quality coke for furnaces in Birmingham. The ovens burned around the clock, and the town thrived with miners, merchants, and families who depended on the industry. The work at the ovens was grueling and dangerous. Laborers—many of them immigrants from Eastern Europe, Italy, and African American workers from the South—endured long hours in extreme heat and toxic fumes. Yet out of this hardship, a strong and diverse community formed. West Blocton grew to include churches, schools, shops, and a vibrant town life. The coke ovens provided steady employment for decades, helping fuel not just industry but also the hopes and dreams of generations of working

families. tury, the demand for beehive coke declined. New technologies made the around them.

old methods obsolete, and many smaller coke operations shut down. The West Blocton ovens, once a vital industrial site, were abandoned and fell into disrepair. In the 1990s, recognizing their historical significance, local residents and preservationists launched efforts to save the site. The West Blocton Coke Ovens Park was established, restoring a portion of the ovens and creating a walking trail and inter-

pretive signs for visitors. Thanks to community dedication, the site is now a peaceful natural area where visitors can explore the ovens, walk through the woods, and learn about the town's industrial past. Each year, the park also hosts events like the Cahaba Lily Festival, connecting history, nature, and community. The West Blocton Coke Ovens represent more than just an industrial relic-they are a testament to Alabama's role in America's steel-making era, a memorial to the laborers who powered progress, and a preserved piece of a proud town's heritage.

As you walk among the moss-covered bricks and peer into the arched chambers once filled with fire, you step into a story of grit, growth, and resilience. The ovens may be silent now, but By the mid-20th cen- they still speak—of history, of hard work, and of the community that rose

Dear Mr. Oakley:

I read a piece in your paper a few weeks ago about the early shipping of cotton down the Cahaba River. I believe my father Josiah Lightsey was the first to transport cotton down the Cahaba River by boat. I know he was married on December 24, 1855 and had to leave on his boat the next day as the river was rising and was high enough to get his cotton boat over the shoals.

I'm quite sure that trip was not his first. He was 44 years old when he married and he was in the cotton shipping business before he was married. He built his cotton boats on the bank of the river on the Uncle Bill Logan place, because the water was deep there, and he had to have deep water-to turn the boat in.

The bottom was built first, bottom up. It was securely corked with a roll of cotton, then thoroughly pitched with pine tar. I can remember watching him make the tar from very rich pine splinters, then the bottom of the boat was pushed into the deep water and turned over. The boat

was finished in the river, then securely tied up to wait for high water, and he would stop at each big cotton farm and load the cotton bales.

The boat was guided by two large oars, propelled by man power. They didn't have


such things as motor power in those days. Father suffered a stroke in 1885 and was never able to make another trip down the Cahaba River, but every year he wanted to go. It had been his life for so many years. He didn't want to give it up. Sometimes he sold his cotton at Selma, but other times he went on to the mouth of the Cahaba to

await a steam boat to tow his boat on to Mobile. Father was a subscriber to

Bibb Blade as far back as I can remember (and I'll be ,85 in August of this year). He continued to take the county pass until his death in 1899. He was the oldest of 12 children and outlived them all. I am the only one of the children living.

The Brent Utilities Board is located in the town of Brent, approximately 50 miles south-southwest of Birmingham and serves residents of Bibb County, Alabama. Our water is treated well water of the highest quality and meets all standards set by the Environmental Protection Agency and the Alabama Department of Environmental Management. Our wells are sourced in the Knox Aquifer found in northern and central Alabama. The Knox Aquifer is composed of thick-bedded dolomite that is interbedded with limestone and chert. An assessment of our source water (wellhead protection) has been prepared. A copy of the assessment may be requested at our office. Our well water is chlorinated for disinfection prior to distribution. Well no. 4 is also aerated.

We routinely monitor the quality of your water as it relates to treatment and delivery to your home. Public water systems must monitor over 75 contaminants. The table provided summarizes the results. Please note that a detected contaminant does not mean a health risk is present, it simply means that it was detected in the tests. Only contaminants in excess of the MCL (Maximum Contaminant Level) are considered a violation. The table shows the results for our monitoring for the period of January 1 through December 31, 2024, or data from the most recent testing done in accordance with applicable regulations

MCL's are set at very stringent levels. To understand the possible health effects described for many regulated constituents, a person would have to drink 2 liters of water every day at the MCL level for a lifetime to have a one-ina-million chance of having the described health effect.

All drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environ-mental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline at 1-800-426-4791. The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells.
