Massive Fire and Explosion Rock Stella-Jones Pole Yard in Brierfield

A massive fire broke out Saturday night at the Stella-Jones Pole Yard located near the Brierfield/Six Mile community, close to the Bibb/Shelby County line on Alabama Highway 25. The incident quickly escalated, drawing in multiple fire departments and emergency responders from surround-

ing areas. The fire was first reported around 9:30 p.m. as large flames and heavy smoke began rising from the industrial site. Emergency crews arrived on scene and worked quickly to contain the blaze, but the situation intensified overnight.

At approximately 2:15 a.m., a series of powerful explosions occurred, shaking nearby homes and lighting up the night sky. The explosions caused significant damage to fire equipment on scene and forced a full evacuation of all emergency personnel. One firefighter sustained minor injuries during the explosion and was transported to a local hospital for treatment. The extent of injuries from other departments remains unknown at this time.

"This was a very dangerous and rapidly evolving fire," said one responder. "Our crews did everything they could to protect the community and ensure everyone's safety."

Several firefighting apparatus were damaged during the incident, and officials are now assessing the full impact. The site remained active into Sunday morning as smoldering debris and hot spots continued to pose risks.

The cause of the fire and explosions is currently under investigation. Authorities have not yet released any details regarding what may have triggered the initial fire or the subsequent blasts.

Stella-Jones is a ma-

jor supplier of treated wood products, including utility poles and railway ties. The materials stored at the site — including creosote-treated poles may have contributed to the intensity of the blaze.

Residents in the surrounding area were urged to stay clear of the scene due to smoke and safety concerns. No evacuations of homes were ordered, but many locals reported hearing and feeling the explosions during the early morning hours.

More information will be released as the investigation continues.

Candace believes in the power of local news and the role it plays in smalltown life. "Local news is extremely important to me. I believe that change



City of Brent Receives ALM Senior Risk Management Award

The City of Brent was recently awarded a Silver Risk Management Award by the insurance division of the Alabama League of Municipalities.

Approximately public entities participate in one or both of the Alabama League of Municipalities (ALM) sponsored insurance programs which are the Municipal Workers compensation Fund (MWCF) and the Alabama Municipal Insurance Corporation (AMIC). The Board of Directors of both insurance programs approved the establishment of a Risk Management Award system in 2002. The award system recognizes those members who have instituted risk management and loss control activities in an effort to reduce their loss ratio. Risk management and loss control activities

not only benefit the member's loss ratio but also the overall success of the League sponsored insurance programs. Through the efforts of the City of Brent, employee, property and liability losses are being minimized; and -most importantly – employees and citizens are reaping the rewards of a safer work-

place and community. Recipients of the President's Risk Management Award, which included the top 5% of those members with minimal losses for a five-year period, received a specially designed memento. Three additional levels of achievement – Gold, silver and Bronze – were also recognized. Recipients in these categories receive a plaque for the first year they are acknowledged and then a plate to be attached to the plaque for subsequent years. The Gold, Silver and Bronze levels were for loss ratios of below 5%; 5% to 20%; and 20% to 40%, respectively.

Based in Montgomery, the Alabama League of Municipalities was organized I 1935 and serves as the recognized voice of the cities and towns in Alabama. Representing more than 455 member municipalities, the League works to secure enactment of legislation enabling all cities and towns to perform their functions more efficiently and effectively, offers specialized training for both municipal officials and employees; holds conferences and meetings at which views and experiences of officials may be exchanged, and conducts continuing studies of the legislative, administrative and operational needs, problems and functions of Alabama's municipal governments. 



Tallassee Cotton Mill: Alabama's Industrial Pioneer

REPORTER Nestled along the banks of the Tallapoosa River in east-central Alabama, the Tallassee Cotton Mill once stood as a proud symbol of Southern industry and resilience. Established in **1841**, it is widely recognized as the oldest continuously operating textile mill in the United States until its closure in the early 2000s. With a rich legacy stretching over 160 years, the Tallassee Cotton Mill helped shape the economic and cultural landscape of Alabama

The location of the mill was no accident. The rushing waters of the Tallapoosa River provided the perfect source of hydropower needed to run the machinery of the early textile era. The Tallassee Cotton Mill quickly became the heartbeat of the town, employing hundreds of workers and giving rise to a surrounding mill village that offered homes, stores, and churches to mill families.

Built from sturdy brick and stone, the mill's original architecture reflected the craftsmanship of the 19th century. Its large

BY SHEILA DUNCAN windows, thick walls, and manufacturing towering structures were both functional and impressive—designed to withstand time, heavy use, and the elements.

> During the Civil War, the Tallassee Cotton Mill played a vital role in the Confederate war effort. It produced cloth for Confederate uniforms and other military supplies. Remarkably, while many Southern mills were destroyed during Union raids, the Tallassee Mill survived. Its location and strong local defenses likely contributed to its preservation, making it a rare industrial survivor of that era.


> For over a century and a half, the mill operated as a cornerstone of the local economy. Generations of families worked within its walls, passing down skills and stories. From the Reconstruction era to the Great Depression, through wars and waves of modernization, the Tallassee Cotton Mill adapted and endured.

By the late 20th century, however, the textile industry in the United States began to decline due to globalization and shifting The Tallassee Mill eventually ceased operations in 2005, bringing an end to an

In 2016, a devastating fire swept through much of the old mill complex, destroying large portions of the historic structure. The loss was felt deeply by the community and historians alike, as it erased one of the last standing monuments to Alabama's industrial past.

Fire At Cahaba Pressure Treated Forest Products

A fire broke out in one of the treating plants at Cahaba Pressure Treated Forest Products in Brierfield last Thursday night at approximately 8:30.

According to Bret Jones, a Cahaba Pressure employee, a small fire ignited in one of the treating cylinders, but little damage occurred and no one was injured. Jones said the cause of the fire is unknown and no formal investigation is underway and has been turned over to the insurance company. A few poles were damaged, but the plant was not burned at all. Jones said "It could have been a bad situation, but the Brierfield Fire Department responded and was there in 6 or 7 minutes." The Montevallo Fire Department was also on hand, as were the Brent, Centreville and West Blocton Departments, and three Cahaba Pressure night crew employees. "We are fortunate the response was so fast" said Jones, "and no one was hurt. We can fix everything else."

Jones said the Brierfield Fire De-partment, which is located quite a distance from the work site, is contemplating installing a branch of the department on the work site.

Jones said there is no anticipation of problems in connection with run-off from the process of extinguishing the fire, and the plant was in operation the day following the fire.
