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## **Trump-Endorsed Lt. Governor Candidate Trails by 12 Points, Polls Underwater on Favorability**

*Senate Race a Three-Way Statistical Tie; 78% of GOP Primary Voters Name Economics as Top Issue*

**Montgomery, AL** — The Alabama Poll’s fourth consecutive statewide survey of likely Republican primary voters finds a presidential endorsement producing unexpected results in the Lieutenant Governor’s race — and a U.S. Senate primary that has tightened into a three-way statistical tie despite more than \$6 million in committed outside spending. The survey of 600 likely voters was conducted in March 2026 with a margin of error of  $\pm 4.0\%$  at a 95% confidence interval. Overall topline are listed at the end of the release.

### **Lieutenant Governor: The Endorsement That Isn’t Moving the Race**

The Lieutenant Governor’s race presents the most striking data point of the March poll. **John Wahl**, the Trump-endorsed ALGOP Chairman, stands at 7.0% in the ballot and carries a **net negative favorability rating** — 12.3% favorable against 14.0% unfavorable, a NET of  $-1.7$ . He trails non-endorsed Secretary of State **Wes Allen** by 11.7 points. With 60.2% of likely primary voters still undecided, the race remains fluid — but a candidate bearing a presidential endorsement has yet to convert that advantage into voter support.

Michael Lowry, founder of The Alabama Poll said, "The conventional wisdom says a presidential endorsement settles a primary. The Lieutenant Governor's race says otherwise. The Trump-endorsed candidate is the only one in the field with a net negative favorability rating, and he trails by nearly 12 points. There’s certainly room to recover but this isn’t what any campaign wants to see a month and half out."

Allen leads at 18.7%, followed by **Rick Pate** at 8.8%, who has shown consistent upward movement across the last two polls. **Nicole Wadsworth** stands at 5.3%.

## U.S. Senate: A Three-Way Dead Heat

The U.S. Senate Republican primary is a statistical three-way tie. **Barry Moore** leads at 22.8%, **Steve Marshall** stands at 20.7%, and **Jared Hudson** holds 19.0% — all three within the poll’s ±4.0% margin of error. With 34.5% of voters still firmly undecided, no candidate has secured a winning position. Over \$6 million in committed outside spending in support of Moore has produced a lead of 2.1 percentage points — less than the margin of error.

Marshall enters the advertising phase with a 39.5% favorable rating and geographic breadth across markets representing 78% of the state’s likely primary electorate. Hudson, at 19.0%, holds a net favorability of +22 despite 49% of voters having never heard of him — and \$428,000 in campaign funds unspent.

"Barry Moore has had more than \$6 million in committed outside spending on his behalf but has only produced a 2.1-point lead — less than the margin of error. Three candidates are statistically tied with two of them not actively advertising at the point of the poll. Moore gained six points from my last poll, but spending \$950,000 to do so is troubling. That is not the result that level of investment should have produced."

## Economic Environment: An Anxious Electorate

Seventy-eight and a half percent of likely Republican primary voters name an economic issue as the most important problem facing Alabama — the highest share recorded across all four Alabama Poll surveys. Groceries and food prices top the list of specific household cost pressures at 50.2%, followed by utility bills (35.5%), healthcare (28.2%), insurance costs (27.8%), and gas prices (24.5%).

Alabama Republicans remain broadly optimistic about state direction: 58.7% say the state is heading in the right direction against 29.3% who say wrong track, a NET of +29.3. That optimism coexists with significant household budget pressure – a combination that no candidate in any of the contested races has yet addressed convincingly.

"These voters are not in open revolt — Trump's approval is NET +66 and 58.7% say Alabama is on the right track," Lowry continued. "But ask them about their household and the picture changes fast. Seventy-eight percent name an economic issue as the most important problem, and half cite groceries specifically. No candidate in any of these races has seized that opening yet and claimed those voters."

## Down-Ballot Races

**Attorney General: Jay Mitchell** (12.3%), **Katherine Robertson** (9.8%), and **Pamela Casey** (9.3%) are statistically tied, with 68.5% of voters still undecided.

**Commissioner of Agriculture: Christina McInnis** leads for the first time at 9.0%, edging **Jack Williams** (8.8%) and **Corey Hill** (7.0%), with 75.2% undecided.

## Methodology

The Alabama Poll surveyed 600 likely Republican primary voters in March 22-24, 2026 using a multi-modal methodology combining live telephone interviews (landline and cell phone) and self-administered text message surveys. Interviews were stratified by area, race/ethnicity, age, gender, and vote history based on prior Republican primary turnout patterns. To qualify, respondents had to indicate they are likely to vote in the May 2026 Republican Primary. The margin of error is  $\pm 4.0\%$  at a 95% confidence interval; error margins increase for cross-tabulations.
